What is Higher Education?


A course that you study at 18 or older and is Level 4 and above































Repayments?

You only make repayments when you earn over £25000

Repayments are based on what you **earn** each month, not how much you borrowed



















Repayments?





You pay back 9% of this amount each month

= £30 a month



















Everyone has access to Student Loans,
